Canon Benaiah Poggo College

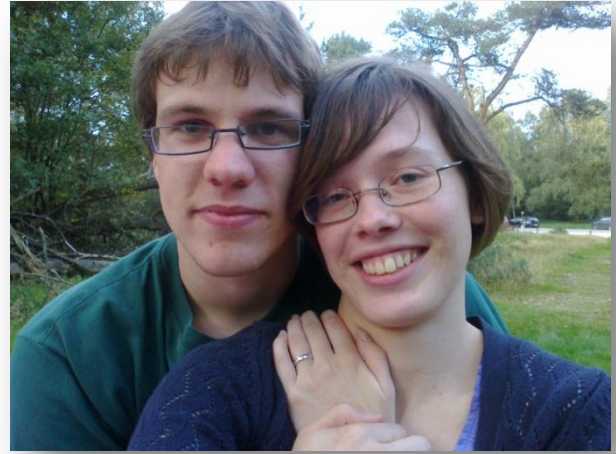

This year has had its downs but it also had some major peaks. I have really enjoyed this year and hope you have too.



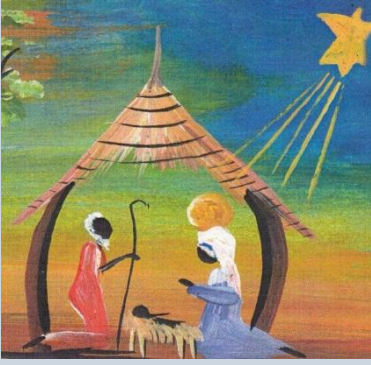
Desta
